Teacher Professional Development

The teachers are currently reviewing the Numeracy programme with the target being our students having the ability to reason and apply mathematical concepts in real life contexts. This is done in partnership with our 'Learning Pit' to support our students being able to realise they are learners and how to keep going when they find things hard. More explanation about our 'Learning Pit' approach next week.

As well as this, Miss Harris has been using the techniques of the 'Better Start Literacy Approach' programme in her class.

"The Better Start Literacy Approach is a structured approach to literacy instruction for Year 0 to Year 2 classrooms, to support children's early reading, writing and oral language success. It has been developed by our team specifically for our New Zealand educational and cultural context and controlled research trials have proven its effectiveness. It includes the systematic teaching of critical phonological awareness skills and letter sound knowledge skills through fun, games-based activities, activities making explicit links to the reading and spelling context, and structured small group reading sessions using the new Ready to Read - Phonics Plus early readers series. In addition, the approach includes explicit teaching in vocabulary skills and in building children's oral narrative and listening comprehension skills through quality children's story books. The Better Start Literacy Approach follows a structured phonics scope and sequence that is used in the class and small group reading teaching."

This has been working exceptionally well and we are seeing some amazing results from our children. We now have Mrs Trumper, with Whaea Rora and Whaea Sarah, completing the training. This will ensure continuity across our junior classes in literacy and give our tamariki a fantastic start to their reading and writing.


sure they are ok.

Our writing focus this term is on 'persuasive writing'. The




Persuasive writing is any written work that tries to convince the reader of the writer's opinion.

Dear Parents/ Caregivers

A few cases of head lice have been detected in our school. Anyone can get head lice, mainly through direct head-to-head contact but also from sharing hats, brushes and other personal items. Head lice are a problem in many communities and do not reflect poor hygiene or social status. Please do your part to prevent the spread of head lice by checking your child(ren) daily for the next few weeks, and on a regular basis thereafter. Lice infestation is much easier to treat if caught early. If you should discover a case of head lice, please notify your child's teacher.

Chemical treatments

Chemical treatments or wet combing are the usual ways to treat head lice. Talk to your pharmacist, doctor or nurse for advice. Ordinary shampoo or soap will not kill head lice. Do not use fly spray, kerosene or animal treatments, as these may harm children.

- Chemical treatments use a special shampoo or lotion (containing insecticide) that kills the head lice and the eggs. Follow the instructions that are supplied with the chemical treatments.
- Always do a second treatment 7–10 days after the first. This is to kill any head lice that may have hatched after the first treatment.

Wet combing

- Wet the hair and scalp with conditioner (this makes it easier to see the head lice).
- Use a fine-toothed comb to check for head lice and eggs and to comb them out. It's best to use a fine metal comb, or a special head lice comb you can get from a pharmacy.
- Comb the full length of the hair, from the scalp to the ends. Work your way around the head so that you have combed all of the hair.
- If you see any head lice or eggs, clean the comb by wiping it on a tissue or a paper towel, or rinse the comb before you use it again.
- After you have combed all of the hair, rinse out the conditioner.
- Repeat the wet combing each week until you don't find any more head lice or eggs.

Stop head lice from spreading

It's not possible to completely prevent head lice because they're very common. But there are things you can do to stop head lice from spreading.

- Brush hair every day. This may help kill or injure head lice and stop them from laying eggs.
- Don't share brushes, combs, headbands, ribbons, hair clips, helmets or hats anything that touches someone's head.
- Having short hair or wearing hair in a ponytail if it's long makes it less likely you or your child will catch head lice.
- Children should hang their clothes on their own hook at school.
- Children should keep their clothes apart from other childrens in swimming or sports changing rooms.
- If you do get head lice in your family, everyone should be treated at the same time.
- Let the school and any other close friends know that your child has been treated for head lice.

Remember - Anyone can get head lice:

- Check your children's hair every week for head lice.
- If you find head lice or eggs you need to treat them.
- Repeat the treatment: 7–10 days later for chemical treatments and weekly for wet combing.
- For more information, talk to your pharmacist, doctor or nurse.
