School Board Elections

Parent Election Notice (notify community)

Nominations are open for the election of 5 parent representatives to the school board.

All eligible voters will receive a nomination form. Use this form to nominate yourself or someone in your community. You will also receive a nomination cover letter calling for nominations. Information on who is not eligible to be a board member is provided with this notice, and the nomination form.

If you need more nomination forms, contact the school office.

Nominations close at **noon** on Wednesday 6 August 2025. You may provide a signed candidate statement and photograph with your nomination.

The electoral roll is held at the school and can be viewed during normal school hours.

As nominations are received, there will be a list of candidates' names kept at the school up until election day, which you can view.

Voting closes at 4pm on Wednesday 10 September 2025.

Returning Officer

People who are not eligible to be school board members

The following people are not eligible to be school board members. A person who:

- · is an undischarged bankrupt; or
- is prohibited from being a director or promoter of, or being concerned or taking part in the management of, an incorporated or unincorporated body under the <u>Companies Act 1993</u>, or the <u>Financial Markets Conduct Act 2013</u>, or the <u>Takeovers Act 1993</u>; or
- is a permanently appointed member of the Board staff, unless they are standing for election as a staff representative; or
- contracts or sub-contracts with the Board without the approval of the Secretary of Education and receives payments exceeding \$25,000 in any financial year. This would also cover situations where a person has a 10% or more shareholding in the contracting company or a company that controls the contracting company; or
- is subject to a property order under the <u>Protection of Personal and Property Rights Act</u> 1988; or
- has been convicted of a specified offence identified in <u>Schedule 2</u> of the Children's Act 2014, unless that person has obtained a pardon or been granted an exemption; or
- is a person in respect of whom a personal order has been made under that Act that
 either the person is not competent to manage his or her own property affairs, or does not
 have the capacity to communicate/make decisions relating to his/her welfare/personal
 care; or
- is a person who has been convicted of an offence punishable by imprisonment for 2
 years or more, or who has been sentenced to imprisonment for any other offence, unless
 that person has obtained a pardon, served the sentence, or otherwise suffered the
 penalty imposed on the person; or
- is not a New Zealand citizen, and is
 - □ a person to whom section 15 or 16 of the Immigration Act 2009 applies; or
 - a person obliged, by or pursuant to that Act, to leave New Zealand immediately or within a specified time, being a time that was less than 12 months; or
 - deemed for the purposes of that Act to be in New Zealand unlawfully.

A returning officer for an election (or by elections) of board members is not eligible to be nominated as a candidate in that election.

Automatic External Defibrillators

1.REREWHAKAAITU HALL

2.803 ASH PIT RD (T&H HAMILTON)

The Automatic External Defibrillator that is situated at the Hall is locked. If you have an emergency where you need to access the machine, dial 111 and they will give you the pass code that will open the cabinet

There is also a fully automatic defibrillator available at Trevor & Harriet Hamilton's residence 803 Ashpit Road, around the back side of Lake Rerewhakaaitu. Because this defibrillator is fully automatic no training is required simply turn on and place the pads on the patient, the device takes over

This defibrillator is registered with St John. The Defibrillator is positioned at the front door under the porch and is in a non-coded box for quick access.



These machines can help to save lives and the St Johns statistics show why we need an AED:

1. Each year more than 2,000 New Zealanders will suffer a cardiac arrest outside of hospital

For 72% of cardiac arrests a bystander will perform CPR
 People may show no warnings or prior symptoms and 12% survive to hospital discharge following a cardiac arrest

4. Use of an AED within 3-5 min of collapse can increase the chance of survival by up to $44\%\,$
