Next Term, as well as our structured Literacy and Numeracy programmes, our term topic study is Te Ao Maori. This will focus on Maramataka. Maramataka refers to the traditional Māori lunar calendar, which is used to track the phases of the moon and guide activities like planting, fishing, and hunting. The term "Maramataka" literally translates to "moon turning" or "turning of the moon". It is a system that connects the cycles of the moon with environmental factors to determine the most suitable times for various activities.

Through Science we will investigate the "living world" strand about living things and how they interact with each other and the environment. The 'planet earth and beyond" strand that is about the interconnecting systems and processes of the Earth, the other parts of the solar system, and the universe beyond. Through Social Studies the students will learn about how people perceive, represent, interpret, and interact with places and environments. They will come to understand the relationships that exist between people and the environment. Through Technology we will be focusing on our passion projects of Materials technology- Whakairo- Carving wood and bone, Food technologycooking, and design technology- gardening - designing community gardens. So a great term planning for our children!


Facts of the week: An ostrich's eye is bigger than its brain!

REREWHAKAAITU

Automatic External Defibrillators

1. REREWHAKAAITU HALL

2.803 ASH PITRD (T&H HAMILTON)

The Automatic External Defibrillator that is situated at the Hall is locked. If you have an emergency where you need to access the machine, dial 111 and they will give you the pass code that will open the cabinet

There is also a fully automatic defibrillator available at Trevor & Harriet Hamilton's residence 803 Ashpit Road, around the back side of Lake Rerewhakaaitu. Because this defibrillator is fully automatic no training is required simply turn on and place the pads on the patient, the device takes over

This defibrillator is registered with St John. The Defibrillator is positioned at the front door under the porch and is in a non-coded box for quick access.



These machines can help to save lives and the St Johns statistics show why we need an AED:

- 1. Each year more than 2,000 New Zealanders will suffer a cardiac arrest outside of hospital
- For 72% of cardiac arrests a bystander will perform CPR
 People may show no warnings or prior symptoms and 12% survive to hospital discharge following a cardiac arrest
- 4. Use of an AED within 3-5 min of collapse can increase the chance of survival by up to 44%



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
